### Child population

### Wages

Iowa families are working hard, but wages have not kept up with costs and productivity. All workers, especially those with children, must earn well above the minimum wage to meet even a bare-bones budget.

Wage needed to meet basic needs: single parent with 1 child under 6 <b>Iowa: \$21.16</b>	<b>\$18.34</b>
Wage needed to meet basic needs: 2 working parents with 2 children <b>Iowa: \$16.11</b>	<b>\$16.60</b>
State median wage	<b>\$19.19</b>
State minimum wage	<b>\$7.25</b>
