

Common Good Iowa forged a path to progress

Analysis Private school map shaped voucher debate

Did you see this map during the voucher debate? Many did. Our widely shared map showed how vouchers subsidize private school tuition for wealthy families at the expense of many rural communities with few or no private schools.



"Forty-one counties in Iowa have no private schools, according to the group Common Good Iowa. Another 23 counties only have one private school."

Advocacy Public pressure netted food for 241,000 kids

Thanks to the advocacy of Common Good Iowa and partners in the Iowa Hunger Coalition, in June Iowa reversed course and opted into a federal initiative bringing food assistance to 241,000 Iowa children.



Assuring Iowa participated in summer Pandemic EBT, which helps families put food on table in when there are no school meals, was a priority of CGI and coalition leaders. A CGI query to HHS staff on the state's plans netted this response: "Iowa is not participating in the summer Pandemic EBT program this year."

Iowa would be leaving \$28.9 million dollars in federal nutrition assistance — about \$120 per child — on the table by refusing to apply.

CGI staff and partners jumped into action to urge state officials to reverse course. We talked to the media. We worked with legislative allies and alerted advocates, quickly gathering 41 signatures from hunger-fighting groups on a letter to the governor. Even before the letter went live, the pressure had gotten through. The night before its release, news leaked out that HHS had decided to apply for P-EBT.

CGI issued early alert on youth data

In March, Common Good Iowa was among the first to report that Iowa is pulling out of the Youth Risk Behavior Survey, which, for 25 years captured data on adolescent health, including alcohol use, violence, mental health and suicide.

They say, "You can't improve what you don't measure." By abandoning the YRBS, Iowa is losing an essential tool for measuring the well-being of Iowa youth — notably, one that best compared the experiences of straight and cisgender students with LGBTQ+ students — and with it a degree of accountability for meeting their needs.

Connecting Policy conference brought lowans together

Advocates, community leaders and students gathered at our November Policy Wise in Iowa event, where they wrestled with topics from wages, tax policy and open government to school vouchers and AI — all informing the fundamental question: how to expand opportunity for every Iowan?





Common Good Iowa shapes the news

CGI appeared in the media nearly 70 times in 2023, an average of more than once a week. We appeared across the state — in major dailies, small-town weeklies, digital-only upstarts and on radio and TV.



"The situation is dire. With the [federal] child care dollars expiring, the squeeze on child care providers will mount in lowa, causing families to lose access and providers to continue to struggle," said Sheila Hansen, senior policy advocate and government relations manager for Common Good Iowa.
